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Student Program Planning Meeting

All students will have an individual program planning meeting with their school counselor (meetings will take place February 7th through March 25th)

At this meeting, the counselor and student will discuss:

- Their current progress regarding earning credits required for graduation
- Their current progress regarding NYS Regents exams required for graduation
- Post-secondary interests (college, major, career, vocational, work)
- Their academic program/course request for next year
- Their elective requests for next year – and alternates in case you don't get your first choices

How Should they Prepare for their Program Planning Meeting?

- Counselors will be giving program planning presentations to ALL Social Studies classes over the next two weeks
- Before the individual program planning meeting, student/parent/guardian should:
 - Review the complete course booklet online
 - Select courses that:
 - Challenge you
 - Reflect your interests and support your potential college major
 - Make you competitive for college admission

Honors/Advanced Placement Courses

- WPHS provides access to honors and Advanced Placement (AP) courses to all students.
- Students currently in an AP or honors course may plan their academic program for the appropriate subsequent AP or honors course.
- Since honors and AP courses are rigorous, with increased expectations regarding the level of student work, conversations should take place between the student, parent, and school counselor to determine if placement in one or more of these courses is in the best interest of the student. Students will, however, still be required to have taken prerequisite courses where applicable.
- Please note that our dual enrollment courses taken for college credit from Westchester Community College, SUNY Albany, Syracuse University, Marist College and Rochester Institute of Technology have specific prerequisites which can be found in the course description.

Honors/Advanced Placement Courses CNTD.

- Know that the challenge is worth the effort! Ask your counselor to share with you all the ways the experience will be valuable to you.
- If you are recommended for multiple Honors/AP classes and you are concerned that the workload might be overwhelming, discuss this with your counselor, parent and subject area coordinator!
- If you are not recommended for an AP/Honors class and you think that would be the appropriate placement for you **Speak to your counselor!**

AP/Dual Enrollment Classes

- AP = The Advanced Placement Program, commonly known as Advanced Placement, or AP, is a United States and Canada-based program that offers high school students the opportunity to receive university credit for their work during high school, as well as a standard measure of achievement in a course. A student must pass the exam to earn the college credit. AP classes are taught by White Plains High School Teachers.

AP/Dual Enrollment Classes CNTD.

Dual Enrollment = Dual Enrollment is a program that allows high school students to take college courses and earn college credit prior to high school graduation. In most cases, college credits earned through Dual Enrollment can be transferred to other colleges or universities. The Dual Enrollment courses are taught by WPHS teachers. Students must pay tuition costs for Dual Enrollment courses.

The cost is significantly cheaper compared to the cost of taking a course directly at the college or university.

Why take AP/Dual Enrollment Classes?

- Dual Enrollment and AP classes can save time and money
- students like the rigor reflected on a transcript with AP/Dual Enrollment classes
- Students like accelerated learning and more rigorous classes
- AP Classes and most Dual Enrollment classes are weighted (1.3 multiplier to final class average)

A+ 97-100% (4.5) X 1.3 =(5.85)

A 93-96% (4.0) X 1.3 =(5.20)

A- 90-92% (3.8) X 1.3 =(4.94)
