

<u>Kindergarten Music - Learning Outcomes</u>

I. Rhythm

- 1. Students will be able to demonstrate steady beat, in songs in duple and triple meter
- 2. Students will be able to perform rhythm patterns learned by rote

II. Pitch

- 3. Students will be able to sing pitches accurately in both Major and minor songs
- 4. Students will be able to aurally identify high/low pitches
- 5. Students will be able to use their speaking and singing voices

III. Harmony

6. Students will be able to accurately sing melodies when accompanied by a chordal instrument

1st Grade Music - Learning Outcomes

I. Rhythm

- 1. Students will be able to demonstrate steady beat consistently, in songs in duple and triple meter
- 2. Students will be able to accurately perform rhythm patterns learned by rote
- 3. Students will be able to distinguish between beat and rhythm when performing on non-pitched percussion

II. Pitch

- 4. Students will be able to sing pitches accurately in more complex Major and minor songs
- 5. Students will be able to identify speaking, chanting and singing voices
- 6. Students will be able to sing simple 2-3 note patterns using solfege syllables by rote

III. Harmony

7. Students will be able to accurately sing melodies when accompanied by a simple ostinato or accompany a song by performing an ostinato

2nd Grade Music - Learning Outcomes

I. Rhythm

- 1. Students will be able to accurately perform, read, and write quarter note, paired eighth notes, quarter rest, and half note using rhythm syllables
- 2. Students will be able to distinguish between beat and rhythm when performing vocally and on various classroom instruments

II. Pitch

- 3. Students will be able to sing pitches accurately in more complex Major and minor songs
- 4. Students will be able to sing, play, read, and write simple 2-3 note patterns using solfege syllables
